WAMA LEGISLATIVE DAY AN IMPORTANT OPPORTUNITY TO ENGAGE BOA, LEGISLATORS

On May 11, about 20 WAMA members converged on the Wisconsin State Capitol for WAMA's legislative day. The event's highlight was an hour discussion with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) Secretary Craig Thompson, Bureau of Aeronautics (BOA) Director David Greene, and BOA staff about how we can work together to more efficiently deliver a program enlarged by the infusion of Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act dollars.

The need for process improvement is driven by the program's increased size and staffing challenges at the BOA. According to Secretary Thompson, the BOA's staffing issues are not unique. These challenges exist throughout the department and reflect what is happening across industries, the state, and the nation, especially with engineering positions.

FEDERAL BILL INTRODUCED TO PROTECT AIRPORT FROM POTENTIAL PFAS LAWSUITS

Senator Cynthia Lummis (R-WY) [introduced five bills](#) to ensure industries and municipalities are not subject to liability claims if the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) designates per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) compounds

as hazardous substances. One of the bills is the [Airports PFAS Liability Protection Act](#).

According to the Lumis press release:

"Lummis introduced this legislation in response to an August 2022 proposed EPA rule to designate two PFAS compounds as hazardous substances under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act (CERCLA), also known as Superfund. This would subject any entity with PFAS contamination to potential CERCLA liability from the EPA and third parties.

Should this rule be finalized, entities such as water treatment plants, landfills, farms and ranches would be held liable for PFAS contamination they are not responsible for and entities such as airports, fuel depots and refineries that are required to test use fire suppression foam that contain PFAS would be at risk for litigation."

The legislation was cosponsored by Sens. Roger Wicker (R-MS), John Boozman (R-AR), Kevin Cramer (R-ND), Pete Ricketts (R-NE), Markwayne Mullin (R-OK), Dan Sullivan (R-AK) and Lindsay Graham (R-SC).

"Providing airports with CERCLA liability protection for complying with long-standing federal regulations and requirements is critical in speeding the transition to fluorine-free firefighting foams," said AAAE President and CEO Todd Hauptli. "We are grateful to Sen. Lummis and other bill sponsors for their leadership and urge Congress to adopt this important legislation as soon as possible."

PFAS airport liability protection was a primary issue WAMA board members discussed with Wisconsin's federal delegation in DC this spring. WAMA continues to monitor this issue and advocate for airport liability protection and the speedy transition to fluorine-free firefighting foams.

BOA EMBARKS ON NEW ECONOMIC IMPACT STUDY

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation, Bureau of Aeronautics (BOA) is undertaking a new economic impact study for public commercial and general aviation airports. Jviation, a Woolpert Company, has been selected to conduct the study. The staff working on the study has completed more than 30 similar studies for other states.

Jviation will collect information and report annual estimated economic impacts for airport management, airport business tenants, average annual capital investment,

and general aviation visitor spending. They will report all impacts in terms of employment, payroll, spending, and total annual economic activity.

This project will take approximately 12 months to complete. The data will provide the BOA, airports, aviation stakeholders, elected officials, communities, and others with important information on the economic contributions of each airport and statewide impacts.

The BOA encourages airports to cooperate with the effort and respond to aviation inquiries. Airports' timely and complete response will ensure a more robust economic impact study outcome for Wisconsin's airports.

The department released its last report on the economic significance of Wisconsin's aviation industry in 2010. The COVID-19 pandemic slowed the department's standard procedure of updating the economic impacts about every decade.

COLLEGE FLYING COMPETITION LANDED in OSHKOSH

The [National Intercollegiate Flight Association](#) SAFECON flight competition was held at Wittman Regional Airport in Oshkosh for the first time on May 8-13.

SAFECON is a collegiate flight competition with more than 500 competitors from more than 30 schools typically competing.

Young pilots from across the country competed for awards in various aviation skills, including landing, navigation, preflight, flight planning, crew-based simulations, safety, sportsmanship, and more.
